Highlights for the 2018-2019 school year

Priorities for Superintendents 2018-2019

1. Fiscal Responsibility

- Supported schools to efficiently utilize funding and
- Ensured appropriate provision and distribution of sub budgets
- 2. **Teacher evaluation** A new teacher evaluation process based on modern research was adopted. The new system is research based and designed to enhance teacher growth with a more descriptive and detailed description of teacher practice that influences student success.

• Another group of schools started following the new requirements for reporting parents on their child's learning.

2019-20

- Grades 11 and 12 start using the new school curriculum as of August 2019.
- The Grade 10 literacy assessment will be available in January 2020.
 - All schools will have shifted to the new requirements for reporting to parents on their child's learning.

How teachers report to parents

- Final written report cards included a student's self-assessment of the Core Competencies, which are a set of intellectual, personal and social skills that all students need to become educated citizens, able to engage in life-long learning. The core competencies include: Thinking (critical and creative), Communication (includes digital media), and Personal and Social Responsibility (cultural identity)
- Kindergarten through Grade 9 report cards did not use letter grades or percentage scores. They use performance descriptions.
- Grades 10 through 12 report cards included letter grades and percentage scores

Looking ahead: Key Priorities for 2019-20

1. Fiscal Responsibility

- a. Supporting schools to efficiently utilize funding; 19-20 Focus: O&M
- b. Frequent and ongoing monitoring of budgets to ensure there are no lapses nor overspending

2. Teacher Evaluation

 a. Implementing the Framework for Teacher Growth in Yukon including Teacher Learning Plan and the use of the Yukon First Nations' Ways of Knowing and Doing Self-Assessment

3. School Growth Plans

a. Aligning the use of inquiry, informed by evidence and YFN ways of knowing, doing, and being, to improve student outcomes

4. Collaboration

- a. Working collaboratively with partners (including Student Support Services, Curriculum and Assessment, First Nations Programs and Partnerships) to help schools implement the revised curriculum, with particular focus on:
 - i. Assessment, grading, and reporting
 - ii. Yukon First Nations ways of knowing and doing

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

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- 3. **School growth plans** Schools continued using the Spiral of Inquiry approach to frame their School Growth Plans. This approach focuses attention around several key questions that staff move through to support growth:
 - What is going on for our learners?
 - What does our focus need to be?
 - What is leading to this situation?
 - How and where can we learn more about what to do?
 - What will we do differently?
 - Have we made enough of a difference?

This inquiry approach is designed to enable educators to plan effectively using measurable data and an inquiry process to support student and school growth. It aligns with curriculum design and is focused on improving student learning.

4. Learning Support

- worked collaboratively with Curriculum and Assessment team to help implement the revised curriculum (moving from what to how), including:
 - i. Assessment changes, grading and reporting
 - ii. Inclusion of YFN perspectives and ways of knowing and doing

Yukon schools follow the British Columbia (BC) curriculum, with adaptations to include:

- Yukon content; and
- Yukon First Nations' ways of knowing and doing.

Timeline of Curriculum Changes

Changes to Yukon's curriculum and the way schools report on student learning are being integrated between 2017 and 2021:

2017-18

- Kindergarten to Grade 9 started using the new school curriculum in September 2017.
- The Yukon Foundation Skills Assessments for Grades 4 and 7 moved to the fall (previously written in winter).
- The new Grade 10 numeracy assessment became available in June 2018.
- Some schools started using the new requirements for reporting to parents on their child's learning.

2018-19

Grade 10 started using the new school curriculum in September 2018.
